Saving the Land to Preserve the History


The Wilson's Creek National Battlefield Foundation is continuing to fulfill its mission of "Preserving and Protecting Wilson's Creek National Battlefield" with two current land preservation projects around the battlefield. One involves an outright purchase of property from a willing seller; the other will protect the battlefield's historic view through a conservation easement.

The acquisition of 60 acres on the southeast boundary of the park will preserve the site of Colonel Franz Sigel's first position on the morning of August 10, 1861, as he placed his six artillery pieces on the hill and waited for orders to fire on the Confederate forces camped in farmer Sharp's cornfield below. Although not included in the park's original boundary, the tract has since been recognized by Congress as a historically significant piece of the

Battle of Wilson's Creek story. The Foundation is currently raising funds to purchase this 60-acre parcel and transfer it to the battlefield, using matching funds from the Civil War Trust and the American Battlefield Protection Program. To complete this project the Foundation has set a goal of raising \$110,000.

The Foundation's second project involves an agricultural easement on land directly behind the Ray House. The Ray House is the only Civil War era house remaining on the battlefield, and preserving the view from this historic structure has always been of paramount importance to the Foundation. The home of John Ray and his family, the house also served as a field hospital in the days after the battle. This project is funded in partnership with the USDA's Farmland Protection Program and the Civil War Trust. The Foundation's goal for this project is to raise \$18,000.

The Foundation was able to raise \$35,000 at the Spring Fling at the Ray House to help fund these two projects. With funds in hand and additional fundraising anticipated, we expect to complete these two projects by December 2013.



Spring Fling is a Real Blast

Arainy morning turned into a beautiful cool evening, as 180 guests gathered to enjoy a night of good food, music, and entertainment at the Spring Fling at the Ray House on May 16th. A large tent pitched on the Ray House lawn overlooking the apple orchard and farmer Ray's cornfield accommodated the guests. James Clary

and the staff of the Tower Club presented a sumptuous feast of Ozark's favorites, featuring Ozark smoked trout appetizers, smoked brisket in sorghum molasses barbeque sauce, and Robert E. Lee's favorite citrus cake and blackberry cobbler for dessert.



The OTC players provided theatrical entertainment, presenting a Civil War period work by Jon Herbert entitled "Beloved Exile." The one-act play centers on a Confederate woman trying to gain a pass through enemy lines from a Union officer to care for her Confederate husband and sons. The plot is made more complicated by the fact that prior to the war she and the Union officer had been romantically involved.



Following the play, guests were treated to a performance by the Loon Rangers, a local band featuring one of our own,

Foundation Treasurer Brian Hickman. Many of us were surprised to see our serious CPA treasurer turn into a guitar-playing songster for the evening. The music from the 70's was great fun, and dancing between the tables even broke out among some of the guests.

Head Park Ranger John Sutton and his staff of volunteers provided the evening's finale, an artillery demonstration that featured a night cannon firing. The roar of cannon and the blaze of fire was a beautiful ending to

a great evening. The Foundation was able to raise about \$35,000 from the event. The funds will be used for two land preservation projects (see land preservation article) to



benefit Wilson's Creek National Battlefield.

Summer Youth Program in Full Swing

This is the ninth year for the Wilson's Creek NB summer youth program, employing students from Central High School at the battlefield. The primary purpose of the summer program is to introduce students to the National Park Service and the many opportunities that are available to them as they search for a career. This year the program began on June 17th and will end on July 19th. The six young people participating are Robert Collins, Kyle Williams, Rachel Thomas, Toby Chamberlain, Jacob Daniel, and Elizabeth Padilla (returning student), with Ken Elkins as the crew leader.

These young people will be working on several deferred cyclic projects at the park, including cleaning the cemetery markers at both cemeteries within the park, installing new regulatory highway signs, stabilizing posts along the tour road, stabilizing bridge abutments with gravel to prevent further erosion, re-staining the main wooden gates at the park entrance, painting bridge railings, and installing split rail fencing, as well as other tasks.

Each Friday an environmental day is planned to inform the students of other types of environmental projects and resources in the greater Springfield area. Some examples of these activities are exploring the Ozark Greenways trails, touring Fantastic Caverns, visiting the Newtonia Battlefield, visiting George Washington Carver National Monument, touring the Springfield Water treatment system, and visiting the Springfield landfill.

Funding for the this year's summer youth program is provided through a partnership with Republic Community Foundation and Bass Pro Inc. Thanks to these generous sponsors for their support.

BATTLEFIELD CELEBRATES 10TH ANNUAL ARTS IN THE PARKS

The Battlefield once again played host to a wide variety of musical groups during the spring Arts in the Parks series. Four different groups performed on Saturday evenings in May, culminating with the Ray House Jamboree on June 1.

On May 4, the day of the infamous May snow storm, the Holmes Brigade Minstrels performed period Civil War music. A small hardy group enjoyed the evening, in spite of the weather. The May 11 program saw a much larger crowd of about 140 as Potter's Wheel played a variety of gospel and southern gospel music. The Missouri State University Community Band was at the park for their annual performance on May 18, with a crowd of about 175, and 250 guests enjoyed the bluegrass music of High Strung on May 25.

During the day-long event approximately 200 people enjoyed the music of several local groups, including Civil War tunes by the Stickley family's Back Porch Players, Irish folk music by James and Jennifer Bennett of Rowan's Crossing, David Greathouse on the guitar, and the Ozark Mountain Dulcimer Troop led by Dennis Norwood. Guests sat in the shade of the Ray House lawn with its cool breezes, munching on popcorn and sipping cold drinks, while other visitors watched Janet Caudillo's spinning wheel demonstrations or took informative tours of the Ray House with park volunteers.

The Arts in the Park series is hosted by the Wilson's Creek National Battlefield, with support from the WCNB Foundation.
